**Lisa** was waiting outside her apartment in **Weymouth** when we pulled up in the truck. Tears immediately began to fill her eyes. *"Thank you so much for helping me. You don't know how much this means to me."*

**Lisa** wept at the sight of **Jesus** and said, *"He's always been there for me. Even in my hardest times, I know He's been there."*

We gave her a hug and assured her we'd keep her in our prayers. We delivered many things to **Lisa** that day including a new start for her family, but by far the most important was the **Love and Hope of Jesus Christ**.

**Lisa** had thanked us before we moved a single piece of furniture; she was simply grateful that a group of strangers cared enough to help.

We began filling **Lisa's** empty apartment with furniture. She was shocked when we brought in a beautiful sofa. *"That's for me!?"* she asked. *"Oh my God, I don't believe it!"*

**Lisa** cried, telling us how hard it had been living in a shelter for the past eight months. While she was homeless, her ten-year-old son lived with his grandmother. She only saw him once a week at best.

*This delivery was clearly about so much more than furniture—we were helping a mother and her son start a new life together.*

We carried in bedroom furniture next. **Lisa** looked at her son's room with a twin bed, dresser, and nightstand filling the space that was empty just a few minutes before. *"You people are angels! He'll be so happy!"* When we brought in a cherry kitchen table with four matching chairs, she said, *"I never imagined anything so wonderful. It'll be so nice to eat together again."*

After we brought in the final items and set things up to her liking, we presented **Lisa** with our final gift. I told her, *"The furniture's not from us. This is the man who sent it to you"* and handed her the crucifix.

## The My Brother's Keeper "Sweatshop"

A special group of about 20 women make up what we affectionately call "The Sweatshop," assembling boxsprings at *My Brother's Keeper* to help get families off the floor and into beds in the most cost-effective way possible.

The materials are provided for us at cost by area businesses and the ladies take it from there: two cut flame-retardant fabric according to a template they created; up to eight ladies sew covers using Kevlar thread on machines they obtained in donation; and two do the final assembly with a compressor, staple gun, and, of course, safety glasses.

Beds are the most requested furniture item at *My Brother's Keeper* and our 'Sweatshop' volunteers make about 1,000 boxsprings each year. They've even included a few men lately to keep up with increased deliveries! Their hard work and dedication saves *My Brother's Keeper* more than \$30,000 annually.

At bedtime, our 'Sweatshop' volunteers don't think of the boxsprings they made or the money they saved, though...they think of children sleeping in beds with a crucifix hanging on the wall above them, a reminder that **God** loves them and has not forgotten them.

## Desperate Measures

Without help from *My Brother's Keeper*, those we serve often endure desperate measures. **Linda**, a single-mother and a full-time record keeper at a local medical office, is a perfect illustration of this sad reality.

While **Linda's** job enabled her to rent an apartment on **Brockton's** quiet east side, affording furniture was another question. Putting her five-year-old son first, **Linda** scraped together a month's savings to purchase a new bed for him.

A new bed for herself, though, was out of the question for **Linda**. She didn't know about *My Brother's Keeper* so she did the only thing she could: she dragged in a soiled mattress and box spring from a neighbor's garbage.



Beds are the most important furniture item we deliver at *My Brother's Keeper* since a good night's sleep is critical for good health and for success in work, school, and life in general. We often witness people sleeping on the floor, salvaging furniture from dumpsters as **Linda** did, or renting furniture from predatory lenders. Our work eliminates the need for people to choose any of these dehumanizing options.

Fortunately, **Linda** soon heard about *My Brother's Keeper* from a friend. When the delivery was scheduled, **Luke Kalinoski** from **Stonehill College** and I brought her a beautiful pillow-top mattress that had never been slept on.

**Linda** was excited to sprawl out on her new bed, but it was the crucifix which truly moved her. "He's the one that gets me through the day," she sighed. "Jesus is always watching out for us." As much as the bed, this seemed to be the message **Linda** needed most in her busy working life.

On Thursday March 11, one hundred and sixty-five women attended the **4th Annual "100 Lovely Ladies"** Fundraiser at **Thorny Lea Golf Club** in Brockton.

The ladies-only event was coordinated entirely by a group of dedicated volunteers from **Easton** (*see Committee picture, right*). It was an incredibly fun night—more than 50 prizes were awarded and local comedienne **Mary Ellen Rinaldi** provided laugh-out-loud entertainment.

The committee worked hard to convey the mission of *My Brother's Keeper* as well. The first course was a simple bean salad to be mindful of the humble families served by *My Brother's Keeper*. Reflections were read between courses. Instead of a silent auction, tables were filled with samples of items we deliver to families in need: linens, a food box, dish sets and even a bed.

The event raised more than **\$13,500** but the impact of the evening is so much greater. First-time attendees are drawn to *My Brother's Keeper* like a magnet and women who are familiar with our work become much more invested in our mission.

**Lori Bechtel**, an attendee, said, *"I was so moved by how much My Brother's Keeper has touched so many lives and the message of HOPE you convey. The woman on the committee amaze me too—all so active, some working full-time jobs, yet still find the time to put this together!
